Author Medea Benjamin on the War in Ukraine at First UU December 12

The Social Justice committee is sponsoring a talk by author Medea Benjamin on Monday, December 12, 2022, at 7 pm on her new book The War in Ukraine: Making Sense of a Senseless Conflict (coauthored with Nicolas J.S. Davies). Russia's brutal February 2022 invasion of Ukraine has attracted widespread condemnation across the West. Government and media circles present the conflict as a simple dichotomy between an evil empire and an innocent victim. Benjamin and Davies insist the picture is more complicated.

Benjamin talks about the killing of over 40,000 civilians, many more armed forces on both sides, and the terrible environmental devastation the continuous bombings of the country's infrastructure have caused. She sets forth a strong case for us to take part in convincing the U.S. Government to join with the Ukrainian Government in negotiating an end to this senseless conflict.

The Ukrainians have forced the Russians back from Northern Ukraine, but also from the Southeast, which the Russians have claimed to now be part of their country. This makes a much better time for the Ukrainians to negotiate with the Russians on some sensible terms for leaving Ukraine.

Skillfully bringing together the historical record and current analysis, the book looks at the events leading up to the conflict, surveys the different parties involved, and weighs the risks of escalation and opportunities for peace.

This is a conflict that is increasingly difficult to resolve, one that could conceivably escalate into all-out war between the U.S. and Russia-the world's two

leading nuclear powers. It's imperative both sides understand this and give diplomacy a chance.

We're privileged to have such a promoter of peace among us as our honored guest. In 2012, Medea was awarded the U.S. Peace Memorial Foundation's Peace Prize. She's also the recipient of the 2014 Gandhi Peace Award, as well as the 2010 Martin Luther King Jr. Peace Prize from the Fellowship of Reconciliation.

A Letter to Rev. Dr. Susan Frederick-Gray

I recently wrote a thank you note to Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, who preached at First UU on Sunday, November 12th. Since the letter was all about you, I thought I would share it with you here.

Dear Susan,

Thank you so much for your visit on Sunday, November 12th, to First UU San Diego. Your sermon about courage and fear and letting go in this liminal time was exactly the message these good people needed to hear.

I had two goals for this visit from you. The first was that the congregation would see that they are part of something larger, and it was wonderful to have you and so many UU luminaries in our meeting house: members of the President's Council, the Executive Vice President, other UUA staff. And the Meeting House was fuller than it has been in a while, with all these folks wanting to come out and see the UUA president. We have a member who is 102, and she was planning to attend with her daughter (after many months away), but unfortunately, she was injured in a fall a few days before the service. She is recovering well, and I trust we will see her again soon.

The second goal was that you and other prominent UU leaders would see the strength and beauty in this congregation as they write their new story. For years they were "the flagship church in the Pacific Southwest." They were the ones who offered help and rarely sought help for themselves. More recently, they have experienced some painful conflict, and I think they have worried they would now be seen as a

"troubled church." But as I watched you listening to the story of their courage and success in the face of great challenge, I could see admiration and appreciation for their gifts in your eyes. And my prayer has been that they could witness you and your colleagues seeing them, as I see them. As a beautiful, imperfect (as we are all imperfect) community of faith that is working through the challenges of living through a pandemic combatting and centuries white of supremacy culture that harms us all and keeps us from fully appreciating each other's gifts.

I am so grateful to you, dear Susan, for your ministry in the larger world and in and with our congregations. You are the president, but you are also always a minister, and we have been blessed by your leadership and your loving presence. Thank you.

Women Together: A History

Part of a series, highlighting different groups, honoring the 150th anniversary of First UU, which begins in January 2023.

In 1980, spurred by Rev. Carolyn

Owen-Towle, an intergenerational planning committee inaugurated a program where women could talk in an atmosphere of friendship, understanding, and social intimacy. The idea was to bring UU women together, without the preoccupations of their worries at work or at home, their children, or their partners in beautiful outdoor settings. These gatherings became known as Women Together.

Eventually, these gatherings included mothers with their teenage daughters, and nursing mothers with their infants.

The retreats were a place where women had the time and ambience to:

- Tell their stories, become friends, talk about what really matters to them as women
- Share music, worship, meditation, meals and walks
- Be playful, laugh together, dream, think and
- Be social witnesses

In the beginning, retreats were held in Jacumba and at the Rosarito Beach Hotel. Carolyn McDade, the composer of the UU Hymn, "Spirit of Life," spoke on "Ministry in

Music" in Rosarito. Five years at Mission San Luis Rey in Oceanside followed, with the theme "Her Story" being interpreted in many different ways. Skits developed in workshops were presented at each retreat, ranging from the poignant and serious to the wild and zany, with diverse perspectives. Carolyn Owen-Towle's sermons during the worship service were always enriching. Other retreats included Ramona, Camp Cedar Glen in Iulian, and DeBenneville Pines.

The theme, "Wise Women," started a tradition of having a panel of women over 70 years of age tell their stories as part of an oral history; other themes were "Anonymous was a Woman," and "Our Similarities, Our Differences, and Our Power." Planning the retreats required the detailed work of a committee for much of the year before the retreat. They were able to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Women Together retreats in 2005.

The current Women Together group meets in the spirit of those retreats. Instead of an annual retreat, there are monthly meetings, on second Saturdays, from noon to 2:00 pm at the Hillcrest Campus. Their next meeting will be on December 10th, for a time of sharing, support, fun, and sisterhood!
