Dr. Janice Marie Johnson, Speaker for 150th Anniversary Celebration Kickoff

Dr. Janice Marie Johnson, as a representative of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), will be joining us the weekend of January 28-29, 2023, to help kick off our 150th anniversary celebration at First UU. She'll attend the reception on Saturday, January 28, and will preach in our pulpit on Sunday, January 29.

Dr. Janice Marie Johnson joined the Ministries and Faith Development staff group at the UUA, in January 2019 as Co-Director. She and Rev. Sarah *Lammert* share this position. They support, sustain, and advance multicultural, anti-oppressive, iustice-centered. and innovative Unitarian Universalist lay and professional leadership and ministry for all ages. She supports the professional lives of religious professionals, especially those of color, those from the trans community, and those from other marginalized groups.

Since joining the UUA in 2009, Janice has served as Director of Racial and Ethnic Concerns, Multicultural Growth Director, and Multicultural Ministries and Leadership Director in the former Multicultural Growth and Witness staff group.

Janice is excited about the UUA's commitment to dismantling white supremacy culture and building the Beloved Community. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. popularized the notion of the "Beloved Community," a term coined by philosopher Josiah Royce. King envisioned the Beloved Community as a society based on justice, equity, and love of others.

Committed to making multiculturalism "real," Janice is a Jamaican, a New Yorker, an internationalist, and a "third-culture kid" who grew up all over the world. She has worked with UU congregations worldwide.

As an educator, she previously served for many years as Director of Lifespan Religious Education at the Community Church of New York.

Janice—mother, grandmother, aunt, sibling, and so much more—treasured a unique relationship with her twin sister, Rev. Dr. Hope Johnson, who served as the Congregational Life Consultant for the UUA's Central East Region and the Southern Region. Hope Johnson died in November 2020.

Please join us as we begin the year long celebration of 150 years at First UU San Diego.



She is a co-creator with Christina Rivera and Kenny Wiley of Teach-In materials to support UU congregations in understanding and fighting against white supremacy. Aisha is a contributor to the groundbreaking 2017 book, Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity and Power in Ministry and co-wrote, with Gail Forsyth-Vail, the accompanying study guide.



First UU Bed & Breakfast Program Needs YOU!!

Can a scavenger hunt help our congregation raise money? The answer is YES!! In Fall 2015, members of the Generosity Ministry Team (GMT) scoured the websites of the 25 largest UU congregations for fundraising ideas. Excited about all we learned, the GMT decided establishing a bed and breakfast (B&B) program was one of the most promising. After researching more than 20 congregations which have (or have had) B&B programs, we were ready to give it try and development of the First UU B&B Program began. Our first guest arrived in May 2016. Since then—and even during pandemic years—guests have arrived. To date, \$33,000 has been raised thanks to 22 First UU hosts who opened their homes to 90+ guests. Our rates haven't changed (\$75/night for a single; \$90/night for double occupancy)—a real steal for accommodations in beautiful San Diego County in 2023!

As folks have begun to travel again, we've been receiving registrations and hope to be able to find hosts for every vaccinated and boosted guest. Over the pandemic years, however, our host homes have dwindled as folks have moved or downsized or can no longer host for other reasons. We're hoping you'll consider becoming a host. Hosts meet interesting UUs from around the country and world as they help raise additional funds for our operating budget. Hosts are asked if their home is available and get to say "yes" or "no" to each request.

Hosts provide a private room with access to a shared or private bath and a continental breakfast. Each host decides when and how often they're willing to receive guests. The Host Application allows you to list any limitation you might have about the types and numbers of guests and the dates you're willing to host. When guest registration forms are received, the B&B Coordinator (Jan Garbosky) contacts a host to see if the dates work. If the host says 'yes,' guests and hosts receive a confirmation email with contact information to follow up on arrival times, continental breakfast options, and other details of the visit. After the check-out date, both guests and hosts receive a Feedback Survey email to share their experience.

We advertise in *UU're Home* (the Bed & Breakfast Directory for Unitarian Universalists & Other Religious Liberals) and in both the online and paper versions of the *UU World* magazine. We also depend on word of mouth advertising, so be sure to let your family and friends who may be planning a visit to San Diego know about our program.

Linda Berez, First UU Member and Chaplain for the Civil Air Patrol

Chaplain Linda Berez is a long-time member of First UU, daughter of Benita Berkson and sister of Susan Berez. Linda was also President of First UU from 1995-96—the first lesbian to be President. Linda joined the Air Force and served from 1988-1990. After becoming an ordained UU Minister in 2007, she wanted to rejoin the military and become a chaplain for them, but by then had aged out of active duty service.

Linda served in parish ministry for a few years and was Minister of Technology for the of the Larger Church Fellowship, an online extension of the UUA. She met her partner Marcia, also a UU minister, in 2004 and they married in 2011. Marcia become an interim minister and they moved to Illinois, St. Louis, and New Jersey. Eventually, they came back to live in Milwaukee.

A colleague of Linda's was a Civil Air Patrol (CAP) Chaplain and suggested Linda look into CAP, the all-volunteer wing of

the Air Force, as a way of serving as a military chaplain. CAP has three missions. One is Search and Rescue, using air and ground teams areas to search areas for downed aircraft, and missing people and to survey disaster areas. They also have a Cadet program, for teenagers ages 12-18, where cadets can learn about leadership and the four core values of respect, integrity, excellence, and volunteer service. Another mission is Aerospace which includes Education in Aerospace as well as Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) programs.

Linda joined the Milwaukee Composite Squadron five of the Civil Air Patrol as their chaplain in

2013 and has been enjoying her time there ever since. In 2021, Linda won the Unit Chaplain of the Year for the Civil Air Patrol in her state, region, and at the national level.

Through the COVID-19 pandemic, Linda ministered to cadets through local and statewide monthly Character Development and Wingman lessons. She volunteered for six Wisconsin Wing

Encampments as Chaplain. An encampment is a week-long leadership cadet training where they program, also cadets introduce the to different aspects of military life. One fun part of the week is when cadets and adults get the opportunity to tour many different types of military aircraft like the KC-135 air tanker, A-10 bomber, and CAP Cessna's, which cadets take orientation rides in with skilled CAP pilots.

Linda provides support to other Squadron Chaplains and Character Development Instructors as the Wisconsin

Wing Chaplain. She also serves at the National level doing IT for the Chief of Chaplains. She estimates that she spends about 10-12 hours a week in her capacity as a Chaplain for CAP.

Because it's a volunteer position, Linda is employed at an Apple retail store, teaching in-store sessions. She loves technology and being a CAP chaplain. She maintains her membership at First UU, where she was ordained, and pledges yearly.
