


Valeria Aguilar, Our New Membership and Social Justice Coordinator

Valeria is now back in her hometown after completing her double bachelor's degree in Political Science and Ethnic Studies at the University of California, Berkeley. While in the Bay Area, she gained experience in community organizing and leadership while further developing her



interest in social justice, education, and collective action. She developed a program to mentor school students to take the classes that would help them get into college. She also worked with incarcerated people in Berkeley. She graduated from Berkeley in December of 2023.

She was raised Catholic, in the Mexican traditional way. She is not a UU but is learning what Unitarian Universalism is and finds the values of the denomination are compatible with her own, particularly the 7th principle about the interdependent web of all existence.

Valeria was looking for a job that was more hands-on than doing something theoretical or research oriented. She found our listing through Mana de San Diego. Established in 1986, the mission of Mana de San Diego is to transform communities by empowering Latinas to achieve upward mobility and a better quality of life. She liked the fact that the values of First UU are grounded in social justice. In the beginning, she will be primarily gathering community input, to see what the congregation would like to focus on concerning social justice. She would also like to get to know everyone. From there, she will see what she can do to make the desires of the congregation happen when it comes to social justice.

She feels that First UU is a place where a person can come in as an outsider and become part of the congregation. She feels this translates into how First UU works with other parts of the larger community. In addition to her social justice duties, Valeria will also be

helping newcomers and others through the membership process at First UU.

Her hobbies, as Tony Bianca pointed out in her introduction during the service at First UU, are crocheting and arts and crafts. She also practices yoga.

Our Sustainable Future: An Update

In 2018, UCSD offered First UU over \$36 million dollars to buy the entire campus. It's telling that the vast majority of you didn't say yes to that deal. That offer set in motion a period of deep discernment and unleashed a great deal of sorrow: Should we stay or go? Will we still be First UU if we don't have our flagship campus in Hillcrest?

First UU began looking at various options—other locations, working out the terms of a deal with the buyer, and considering the physical requirements of any new space. Then the pandemic shut it all down.

The Stay or Go decision didn't disappear, it went underground, with an impact on the life of this church. Questions came up like, "Why are we fixing that if we're just going to move?" "Why should I pledge if we're just going to leave?"

Grief combined with uncertainty is a potent mix. We decided to reconsider the question of Stay or Go again. A wise staff member then asked, "Might there be a way to share this space with the hospital or some other entity that would support our mission and values?" (Paraphrase mine, and the wise staff member was Tony Bianca!) We presented this third option of *Share* at a congregational meeting on January 28. There was a collective sigh of relief and a bubbling up of enthusiasm for this idea.

The question that remained was, "How can we stay here in a way that will be financially sustainable?" To be clear, the members and friends of First UU are all generous in their giving. The parking lot continues to exceed budget in the revenue it generates. Our endowment is robust and, also, continues to generate income.

However, giving is down slightly each year and that trend is likely to continue, with the highest income and highest giving being concentrated in the older members of the congregation. With the new hospital construction and parking garage, our parking lot income is at risk. We must think creatively about managing costs and increasing or stabilizing our revenue.

In March, I convened a steering team to look at three options:

For "Stay," Director of Operations Robie Evans hired a company to complete a thorough assessment of the entire Hillcrest campus and all its systems (HVAC, water and sewer, electrical and internet, roofs, etc)—systems that need regular maintenance or are expensive to replace. This assessment will provide a clearer understanding of the true cost of remaining on this campus. Otherwise, we run the risk of huge, unplanned expenses.

For "Go," team members contacted the commercial realtor we've worked with to find other locations for us. So far, nothing looks appropriate, and the offer to purchase from UCSD is now on hold. To go, we'd have to find someone to buy this property. This remains the least attractive and least possible of the three options.

For the third option, "Share," we've some exciting developments. Our first conversation with UCSD about sharing this property generated great initial interest. With this option, UCSD would buy the entire campus from us (at current market value) and then build space for worship and other needs for us (office space, other gathering spaces, etc).

Unfortunately, UCSD is putting new projects on hold. They recommended another potential partner—Family Health Centers of San Diego, a nonprofit agency that serves the uninsured and underinsured across San Diego County.

Here's the summary of the Family Health Centers conversation:

- They would buy the parking lot and build both parking and office space for healthcare services.
- They might buy one other building for elder services.
- If we want affordable housing built as part of this project, Family Health Centers would find another partner for that, so it is absolutely a possibility.

We've some real options for building a sustainable future, ensuring our financial health in a way that aligns with our mission and offering value to the community. We'll continue to communicate regularly, and ask the congregation to offer ideas, questions, concerns, and support. Let's keep on moving forward!

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY VIRTUAL GA · JUNE 20 - 23, 2024

The 63rd General Assembly will take place virtually this year, from Thursday, June 20, through Sunday, June 23, 2024.

General Assembly is the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles. Please join GA online for this 4-day immersive experience where UU's from across the country and world participate in inspirational worship services and informative workshops, reconvene with friends and colleagues, and explore our virtual exhibit hall.

All registrants can attend Business Meetings but only delegates can vote on business items. First UU has 10 delegate slots—not all of them filled yet. For more information contact <u>John Schaibly</u> or submit an <u>application</u>.

In a world filled with division and challenges, the theme for this year's General Assembly is a powerful reminder of the core principles that unite us as Unitarian Universalists. "Love Unites, Stories Ignite" celebrates the profound impact of love as a binding force that transcends boundaries and fosters connections within our faith community and beyond.

Our faith has always been rooted in the power of storytelling, and this year we'll explore how our stories can ignite change, inspire compassion, and help us build a more just and equitable world. Through storytelling, we share our experiences, our dreams, our struggles, and our triumphs. It's through these stories that we can find common ground, deepening our understanding of one another and the world around us.

Full online registration includes access to GA 2024 online in the Whova event app on your phone, laptop/tablet, and/or desktop, as well as on-demand programming, featured speakers, and major worships.

Full registration is \$400. Financial support is available.

2024 Registration Information

Video of some events from General Assembly (GA) 2024 will be live-streamed, June 20-23—no registration required. Live-streamed events will include the General Sessions and Sunday Morning Worship.

The Ware Lecture, Service of the Living Tradition, and Synergy Bridging Worship will not be available for public live-stream or on-demand viewing. General Assembly registration is required to live-stream these events or access the video on-demand.

GA will offer dozens of outstanding programming selections (workshops, panel discussions, worship services, and other presentations) over the course of five days. Programs will provide attendees with concrete and usable tools to further the work, and the balance needed to explore multiple identity-based and theological perspectives.

First UU's Rose Littler-Riedel, who is heading off to an internship in the Bay Area, will be offering a workshop on "Making Room in the Pews for Working-Class UUs." It can be found in the "On-Demand" section of the schedule in the WHOVA app. <u>Here is a link</u> to the preview video.

Like Unitarian Universalism, GA offers a wealth of theological diversity. A variety of worship choices are offered throughout GA. The Service of the Living Tradition is where we commemorate fellowshipped and credentialed religious leaders, those who have died (including our own Carolyn Owen-Towle), those who have completed active service, and welcome those who have received fellowship or credentialed status in the past year. Sunday Morning Worship at GA is a powerful, communal worship experience and is the largest annual gathering of UUs in Worship.
